Celebrating 90 Years in Middletown!



AAUW Middletown will celebrate its 90th anniversary with a luncheon Saturday, October 10, 2015, at 11:30am, at Brown's Run Country Club. Featured speaker will be Julie Graber, CEO of Gender EQA and Interim Director, ION, a national consortium advancing women to corporate boards. Her topic will be

"Empowering Women and Girls through Data."

The Middletown Branch of AAUW (American Association of University Women) was founded on October 21, 1925, by 12 charter members and grew to 54 members in its first year. In 1942 Mary Lee Bales received the first scholarship from the branch, starting a tradition that continues to this day. AAUW Middletown scholarships are now administered by the Middletown Community Foundation and can be accessed at http://www.mcfoundation.org/scholarships/HSScholarships/AAUW_SCHOLARSHIPS.html. Scholarship funds are generated from proceeds from the group's annual used book sale, a 60-year tradition that promotes literacy and recycling. Other branch fundraisers include a spring garage sale, volunteering for LightUp Middletown, and a holiday bazarr, scheduled this year for Friday, November 13 and Saturday, November 14.

The Middletown Branch has been at the forefront of our community's educational and cultural life for the past 90 years. In 1960 Better Homes & Gardens magazine, along with the National Education Association and the National School Board, awarded AAUW Middletown an Action in Education Citation for their initiative which resulted in the establishment of a Miami University Extension Campus in Middletown.

The American Association of University Women (AAUW) empowers women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research. The nonpartisan, nonprofit organization has more than 170,000 members and supporters across the United States, as well as 1,000 local branches and 800 college and university partners. Since AAUW's founding in 1881, members have examined and taken positions on the fundamental issues of the day — educational, social, economic, and political.



Redistricting Reform: Vote Yes on Issue 1

Have you ever felt that your vote doesn't count? that your voice isn't heard? That's the problem that Issue 1 on the November ballot is designed to correct. This bipartisan constitutional amendment will do away with gerrymandering of Ohio House and Senate districts, instead requiring districts that are more compact and politically competitive. Districts that have been packed with the voters of one party over another give the voter less choice, since the real competition occurs in the primary and not the general election. Issue 1 will also create an open process with more public input before a new plan is adopted.

Please be sure that your members understand the importance of a yes vote on this issue. When there is a better balance of representation, our representatives are more likely to compromise and appeal to mainstream voters rather than to the political extremes of their parties.

You'll find ways to support passage listed on www.yesforissue1.org. These include phone banking (a sample script will be provided), printing and distributing literature, and always-needed cash donations.

Updated National and State Equal Pay Data

The 2015 edition of *The Simple Truth about the Gender Pay Gap* has just been released by our national office. Ohio ranked 34th among the states, as women earned 77% of men's earnings, slightly less than the 78% national figure. Also available this year are data by congressional district—information you can use to lobby your congressman for fair pay legislation. The Quick Facts on the Gender Pay Gap is a great handout to bring your branch up to date on this issue. Promoting an Economic Security Agenda for Ohio Women and Families

Over two-thirds of working women in Ohio are the sole, primary or co-bread winners for their families, yet workplace policies across the state are still rooted in a bygone era when gender roles were very different. Making our policies match the realities of working women and families is long overdue. Our state is severely lacking vital policies that would play a significant role in closing the gap of inequality and breaking down the barriers that hold back far too many women for achieving true economic self-sufficiency.

The Ohio Women's Public Policy Network is a coalition un-like any other group in the state; pulling together key women's advocacy organizations focused on promoting policies that create economic security for women and strengthen Ohio families. Using a collective voice that represents the women of our state, this network works to ensure that public policy reflects the true needs of women and families. In order to make a meaningful impact, The Women's Public Policy Network believes that policymakers must advance public policy that addresses the following issue areas: 1) Promoting an economic security agenda for women; 2) Ensuring fairness and opportunity in the workplace; and 3) Improving women's health and wellbeing.
