


Katrina Kittle is the author of four books for adults: *Traveling Light, Two Truths and a Lie, The Kindness of Strangers, The Blessings of the Animals,* and a tween novel, *Reasons to be Happy*. Born in Illinois, Kittle moved to Dayton in first grade and has mostly lived in Ohio since. She graduated Ohio University as Outstanding Graduating Senior in both the English and Education departments and earned her MFA in Creative Writing at Spaulding University in Louisville College developed Kittle's interest in writing and a career in teaching. She taught English and theatre for eleven years, first at Centerville High School and later at Miami Valley School. She has also worked as a house cleaner, a veterinary assistant, a children's theatre director, a costumer, and as case management support for the AIDS Resource Center. The success of her books has allowed her to travel, one of her great hobbies, and to now earn her living as a writer.

Kittle has a varied presence in the Dayton community. Last October she was the John E. Nance Writer- in-Residence at The Thurber House. Last winter her performance in 100 Saints You Should Know at the Dayton Theatre Guild won her a DayTony for Outstanding Performance in a Leading Role. Kittle offers a wide variety of online workshops through her website OnLiten: Online Enlightenment—Unlock Your Potential!

Kittle's books throw light on numerous topics she has studied in depth: animal behavior, marriage, child abuse, AIDS, eating disorders, and deception. For the Middletown AAUW meeting, Kittle will discuss her journey as a writer and take audience questions about her books and that journey.


DAYS OF SALE we will need two workers at the check out table and some folks to circulate, helping customers and just being visible.


Arts Festival

Charter Schools vs. Public Schools



Jamie Vollmer is an award-winning champion of public education, and the author of the highly acclaimed book, *Schools Cannot Do It Alone*. He has spent the last twenty-five years working with school districts, education associations, foundations, and chambers of commerce across the nation to halt the erosion of public trust and build support for America's public schools. His primary goal is to help educators and their allies remove the obstacles to progress and create schools that unfold the full potential of every child.

Description: In this interactive workshop, Jamie builds on the themes presented in his book, Schools Cannot Do It Alone, and makes the case that this is public education's most hopeful time. He acknowledges the threats arising from multiplying mandates, shifting demographics, media hype, and a changing economy. But he demonstrates how all districts can marshal the tremendous resources at their disposal to initiate a conversation that produces the Four Prerequisites of Progress: community understanding, trust, permission, and support. This presentation introduces the two tracks of The Great Conversation, and includes a discussion of "Nostesia," the mental affliction that prevents Americans from appreciating the progress made by their local schools.

Dear Editor,

One of the elections on the state ballot this year that does not receive much press is the State Board of Education. Many people don't even vote for this position because they don't know the individuals and never heard anything about them. This is a 19 member board with 8 at large positions appointed by the Governor and 11 districts where members are elected. The State Board creates policy and makes recommendations for K-12 education in Ohio.

The American Association of University Women of Ohio endorses candidates only for nonpartisan races, of which the state board of education is one. The Middletown Branch since 1925 has been in the forefront of educational policy and activism in our communities. The following individuals were selected because they are highly committed to supporting public education in Ohio. Currently the majority of the State Board is supportive of privatizing education through charter schools and vouchers that are unaccountable to the public.

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District 3 covers much of Western and Southwestern Ohio surrounding the Dayton area including Middletown. AAUW endorses the former Montgomery County Auditor and Common Pleas Judge **A.J. Wagner**. A.J. taught 3rd grade before beginning his career in law and public service He is also a published children's author.

District 4 includes Hamilton and Warren Counties. AAUW endorses **Pat Bruns**, a retired art teacher and OEA leader from the Cincinnati area. Pat was narrowly defeated four years ago but is well positioned to win in a three-way race this year. Pat has committed her career to expanding opportunities for a well-rounded education for ALL students.

District 10 covers a 17-county area in Southern Ohio from the Ohio River to Springfield. AAUW endorses **Ron Rudduck**, a former teacher, principal and local superintendent from Clinton County who was appointed to fill a vacancy on the State Board last year. He also happens to be an expert on Ohio's unconstitutional school funding system and teaches school finance at Xavier University.

One of the benefits of early voting and mail in ballot voting is that citizens have the opportunity to take time to study the qualifications and platform of candidates. The endorsement process is helpful for citizens to have confidence that the candidate they vote for is most supportive of their views.
