
Suggested by Emilie Marcikic, this book is the story of how America's first women soldiers (part of the U.S. Army Signal Corps) helped win World War

## Diversity Event March 14 Wil Haygood to Speak about 1960's at Miami Regionals



Miami University Regionals will host a lecture by Wil Haygood titled *The 1960s: Why We Are Still Learning from that Unforgettable Decade* on Wednesday, March 14 at 7pm in the Harry T. Wilks Conference Center on the Hamilton campus. Please RSVP to Mel by Friday,

Broadway Distinguished Scholar-in-Residence at Miami's Department of Media, Journalism & Film and the 2017-18 Patrick Henry Literary Fellow at Washington College, Wil Haygood will explore the most tumultuous, bloody, fearless, dangerous decade of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, and how it continues to echo upon present day America. He will talk about some of the iconic figures from that era and why they draw his interest, as revealed in his forthcoming book, *Tigerland*, about an all-black Ohio high school in 1968 that made its way into sports history with grace and glory amidst the tumult.

Haygood's bestselling book *The Butler: A Witness to History* was made into an award-winning film starring Oprah Winfrey and Forest Whitaker. Haygood covered events for the *Washington Post* and *Boston Globe* including Nelson Mandela's release from prison, the ascent of President Obama, Hurricane Katrina, and his own experience as the hostage of Somali rebels.

#### Now Is the Time To Review State and National AAUW News

This very day, or as soon as you have a chance, is a good time to review information on the state and national AAUW websites. Through this review you will be able to update your own information, connect to the Middletown branch website, read the state newsletter Orbit, learn about Equity Day, and look at bylaw amendment changes proposed by the national board of directors.

#### **National**

Many of you may have received an email from AAUW National Board of Directors alerting members to proposed changes in the national bylaws. The three amendments propose 1) allowing nonmembers to serve functions on the board, 2) creating staggered officer and nominating teams so that all elected board members aren't new in the same year, and 3) allowing non-university persons who support the AAUW mission to become full members. Of the three proposals, the most contentious, based on reviews and comments on the national website, is the issue of allowing non-university women into the organization.

Those against the proposal site the word "university" in the name, the exceptional history of the organization, the comradery, and the effort of earning the required degree before becoming an AAUW member. They believe their educations are exhibits of what they fight to secure for other women.

Those for the proposal see value in hearing the voices of differently-educated women who support the mission of AAUW. They see AAUW as more about the mission to help educate and uplift women and less about the requirements for membership. They don't want women denied membership because they didn't have the opportunity for formal education that others had.

The board of directors is strongly in support of this amendment and encourages all branches to have discussions and study all three proposals on the AAUW website. Commentary and proposals of new amendments will close on March 22, 2018. Voting will be online between April 25 and June 9, 2018. Study the issues and begin discussions with your AAUW friends so that we will each become informed voters before the official voting begins.

#### State

The winter issue of Orbit, defines the theme of the AAUW Ohio Convention as "Learn, Share, Do." Featured sessions include help with networking, learning more about public policy, getting financial and dues updates, and practice in creating a branch policy book. The keynote speaker is Angela Clark-Taylor, director of the Women's Center at BGSU. Members who arrive early may attend an information session about the Mounds Heritage Site. Those who stay through Sunday can take a guided trip through the Hopewell Ceremonial Earthworks Site. This issue of Orbit also offers information about each state officer candidate
