



In my large family, we write Christmas wish lists to make life easy for shoppers. My brother's complete list consisted of the words "Peace and Harmony." My mother will cheerfully purchase a polo shirt and a sweater vest for him, creating a kind of peace within herself—knowing that she is still able to buy a few

Christmas gifts and do her part to create joy.

My brother's list got me thinking about peace and harmony. Is that even something attainable? AAUW has worked for the rights of women and attained many of the goals for women the organization has pursued over the years. Who works for peace and harmony? I found the simple answer to that question in UNESCO, The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization. UNESCO is dedicated to "building peace in the minds of men and women."

Tabs on the UNESCO website divide the messages of the organization into themes: Education Transforms Lives; Fostering Freedom of Expression; Protecting our Heritage and Fostering Creativity; Learning to Live Together; Building Knowledge Societies; One Planet, One Ocean; Science for a Sustainable Future; Preventing Violent Extremism. Just looking at that list of themes gives me both hope and fear. I am hopeful because the ideas are so well defined and so in line with the needs of our world and even with the goals of our own branch of AAUW. I am fearful because every day in the news I read instances when governments far and wide, including our own, perform acts that dangerously and immorally oppose these themes.

The UNESCO Constitution written in 1945 made several declarations, including this first and most important one: "That since wars begin in the minds of men, it is in the minds of men that the defences of peace must be constructed." How to attain that peace is described in the 1995 Declaration of Principles of Tolerance. The declaration states: "Tolerance means respect, acceptance and appreciation of the rich diversity of the world cultures, our forms of expression and the ways of individuality expression, it is harmony in diversity, it is a virtue, which makes peace possible."
