AAUW Middletown Branch meeting will be Monday, March 11, 7pm at the Miami University Middletown Campus Library (Gardner-Harvey).

Our speaker is Dr. George H. Sehi, founder of Women Walking West, also known as W3. The organization's mission is to help foreign born women who are living in the United States legally achieve their educational goals. The

organization provides career counseling, tutoring, mentoring, internships and financial support. Dr Sehi is also the founding Executive Dean of Sinclair Community Courseview Campus in Mason, Ohio. Prior to this role he was the Chair of Mechanical Engineering Technology and Dean of the Science, Mathematics and Engineering at Sinclair college's main campus in Dayton. Dr. Sehi has served the educational community in southwest Ohio for more than 30 years.

Attendance Important at March 23 District Summit

Ohio AAUW shook things up this spring with plans for district level summits replacing the state-wide equity day celebration and conference. The purpose of the summits is to get more branch members involved in state-wide initiatives and to focus on women's pay equity and debt advocacy.

You can look forward to learning some strategies for having an impact and to meeting state officers as well as basking in a little glory as the districts receive their state awards. Carpooling is recommended.



Our nominating committee has been hard at work. As often happens, the committee has come up against a wall of fear when seeking a candidate for

Let me share with you what I have learned about this role. First, our branch is a busy one. The president has a lot of work to do. The president must learn the requirements, oversee the whole shebang, run meetings, meet deadlines, and advocate for the group. The role does require organization and a time commitment. Those are the givens. Those are some of the reasons members say, "No, not me."

Here are reasons one might say, "Yes." As president, you will develop a real understanding of what AAUW is about, our branch, our state, and our national organization. You will develop a working relationship and an admiration for every member who serves on the board and on the committees that make our operation so successful. You will depend on them. They will step up to make your job easier in as many ways as possible. The board and the membership will be on your side, cheering your success and ensuring that it happens.

I learned that every president is different, with different talents, personalities, background experiences, and passions. It is wise that we limit a presidency to two years because we get to experience those differences as we move forward. After two years, a president is not burnt out, but ready to keep working for the branch with a new knowledge of its purpose. It is also wise to elect a president who has served on the board so that she has seen the leadership of other presidents.

I have learned that a past-president becomes an advocate for future presidents and the future success of this branch. All presidents before me have worked to leave documents, policies, and strategies in good order. Several past presidents have offered me guidance or agreed to serve on committees as they continue to help this branch meet its mission.

My presidency is nearing its end. We should be voting in April on a new slate of officers. Major positions have candidates except for the office of president. As I write this, no one has stepped forward. Know that if you do, I will support you all the way and am following the lead of my predecessors in preparing a notebook for you and a flash drive that will make your job easier. We are required by national policy to have a president. Please, think about what you have to offer and contact the nominating committee, Anita Shew or Jackie Lankfer, if you are the right person for this role.

Perhaps the nominating committee will have found a candidate for president by the time this note reaches publication. Regardless, I hope you will take this message to heart. There are always positions to be filled. If you are new, busy, not that involved, or hesitant, consider saying "Yes" to lesser roles. I look forward to your fabulous ideas!
