
This is a story about the first mobile library in Kentucky and the brave librarians who brought literacy, hope and a human connection to the Appalachian hills. One reviewer called it "a

# This year I have been reminiscing about AAUW past, present and future. One of the main reasons Ligined our branch was



This year I have been reminiscing about AAUW past, present and future. One of the main reasons I joined our branch was because of the focus on local scholarships. Raising money to help area residents attend college was and still is important to me. The book sale has always had a special place in my heart as it has been

a fun and good fundraiser for our branch and community.

Lately I have been broadening by horizons by checking the National website to see what important issues national AAUW is addressing. I have been observing the connections to us here in Middletown. Economic security for women seems even more important today than several years ago.

I think the National Five Star program for the year was designed by National to help make us more aware of how all the branches are interconnected. National hopes we can make even more of an impact in our local communities. Our programs this year are designed to help us think about collaboration and partnership. We plan to connect more with other area organizations to make our local communities stronger.

At our last board meeting we went over the National Five Star Criteria. We looked to see what criteria we might meet during the year.

In the program area, we need to host 3-5 strategic plan-related programs. Our program committee has planned programs for September on the future educational plans at Miami Middletown, October's YWCA program on empowering women, the March program on the gender wage gap and the April community leadership roundtable. Plans are made to also complete a community resource mapping exercise. We are exploring hosting Work Smart online courses with Miami and Cincinnati State. As an aside, I did complete the Work Smart online course and see how it is useful in planning for salary negotiations.

In the Advancement area, branches are asked to donate an average of \$30 per member to the National Greatest Needs Fund. There is enough money allocated to the more specific funds such as LAF at this time. We have already put a \$2000 donation in our budget for this year. Some individuals have already directly donated to the fund. We thank them for their support. We should be fine in this area. We also need to retain 90% of our members from last year. We have already done this. Thank you to everyone for promptly renewing your memberships.

In the communications area, our communications team will keep our website and face book page up to date with monthly references to the National Work Smart Online course.

The Public Policy and Research section may be a bit more challenging. We do have a public policy chair who keeps us up to date on women's issues and legislation updates. She also will collaborate with our state public policy chair. The challenging parts of this section are hosting at least one public event where Action network sign-ups (two minute activist) are collected. We should also conduct a meeting with a U.S. or state representative. We are looking into these two areas.

The last section includes governance and sustainability. We feel we are progressing in this area as we already plan programs to align with state and AAUW strategic plans. We have been focusing on economic security this year. We also work on bringing in new members to gather new ideas, perspectives and leadership. We have tried to have two members for most of the offices to rotate more members into leadership roles. We are considering having a president and president elect to have a smoother succession of officers.

The National Five Star plan looks challenging but I think we will be able to earn some or all of the stars. I think the plan gives us an opportunity to think more globally and ponder how our branch will move into the future.

# 5 Issues AAUW is Watching in 2020

As the 2020 presidential campaign gets underway, the power of women is on full display. Maybe it's because there are so many women in the race — the largest number in history — or because the candidates are eager to earn our support. Whatever the reason, many issues that matter most to women are receiving attention.

As a non-partisan organization, AAUW doesn't endorse specific candidates. But that doesn't mean we're not advocates for the policies that matter most to us. Indeed, AAUW has a long history of championing policies that advance equality for women in education and the workplace.

So, in the months ahead, AAUW will be watching closely to see where candidates stand on these five issues:

- 1. **Equal Pay for Equal Work.** To close the stubborn wage gap, we need leaders who will pass the federal Paycheck fairness Act and advocate for laws and policies that ensure women are not discriminated against at work.
- 2. Investing in Education. Education is the pathway for women and girls, but too many of our schools are falling short. We need to raise teacher pay, invest in STEM education, protect Title IX and make education a top national priority.
- **3. Reducing Student Debt**. Women hold two-thirds of the nation's \$1.46 trillion educational debt. Policymakers should protect grant programs, champion tuition- and debt-free options and expand loan forgiveness programs.
- **4. Strengthening Social Security.** Because of lower wages and time off from work, women collect about \$320 a month less than men do in Social Security benefits. Our lawmakers need to address the retirement wage gap women face.
- 5. Implementing Paid Leave. The U.S. is the only developed country without paid family and sick leave.
