

100 Years of the 19th Amendment



2020 marks the 100th anniversary of the adoption of the Nineteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which gave women the right to vote. Since then women have voted and have been elected to hold important positions at the national, state, county, and local levels. As we approach November 3, 2020, it is

crucial that we exercise our right to vote and make our voices heard.

We will celebrate women's suffrage in our opening meeting on Monday evening, September 14, when Sam Ashworth will give a virtual presentation: **"Remember the Ladies: The Long Movement Back to Suffrage."** Our Middletown branch had planned to get a preview of the Middletown Historical Society's exhibit on Women's Suffrage at our May 2020 banquet, but that had to be cancelled due to state restrictions on public gatherings during the Covid-19 pandemic. The Historical Society had not yet opened its doors to the public when our 2020-2021 program was planned, so members should look for an email with the necessary link inviting them to join the presentation online. We are opening this program year with online meetings and will evaluate the possibilities for meeting in person as the year progresses.

Carol, a native of Hamilton, graduated from Western College (Miami University) where she met her husband of nearly 64 years, Mike (Myron) in English class. They married and raised their two daughters, Dana and Laurie in Ohio, before moving to Palos Verdes, California, where they lived for 38 years. Carol joined our chapter several years ago when she and Mike returned to Oho and made Middletown their home to be near their daughter Dana, their grandchildren, and great-grandchildren. Carol became a very active and loyal member of our group. She volunteered countless hours sorting, pricing, and working at Book Sales, Holiday Bazaars, and Garage Sales. She was an avid reader and faithful participant in the Joy Luck Book Discussion Group. No matter the activity, Carol could be counted on to contribute her insights culled from a wide background of experiences - 24 years of teaching, involvement in a number of charities, clubs, and the arts, performing in community theater, and love of travel.
