







October Program Focused on Peace

On Monday evening, October 12, Kevin Kelly will give a virtual presentation to share with us about the mission of the Dayton International Peace Museum: to inspire a local, national, and international culture of peace. While the museum is closed during the health crisis, Director Kelly will introduce us to some of the digital exhibits and share some of the upcoming events the museum offers.

Founded in 2004, the Dayton International Peace Museum raises awareness of nonviolent strategies for achieving peace now and in the future. It honors the 1995 Dayton Peace Accords that ended war in Bosnia. The Museum is America's only brick-and-mortar peace museum! It is housed in the Isaac Pollack House, a three-story structure built in 1865 in downtown Dayton. The Museum is a member of the International Network of Museums for Peace, which has members in 27 countries, including Germany, Iran, Japan, Kenya, and South Africa.

Joy Luck Book Club


Thursday, October 15 at 7:00 pm Before We Were Yours – Lisa Wingate

ZOOM State Conference Part II Set for October 10

Ohio AAUW Fall Summit Part II will take place on ZOOM Saturday October 10 from 10 am until 12 noon. Check email from state president Michelle Radtkin for registration information.

The state board has recruited three powerful Ohio women to engage attendees in a variety of issues. Michelle Wilson is a financial advisor specializing in socially responsible investments. Mayor Jennifer Lyle of New Concord, Ohio, is the first woman mayor in the village's 200-year history.

Keynote speaker Cynthia Anderson is a professor of sociology at Ohio University. She serves as Chair of Sociology & Anthropology and Director of Women's, Gender, & Sexuality Studies. Her research and specializations include Theory, Feminist Theory, Rural Labor Markets, Low-Wage Work, and Social Inequality.

Part 1 of the Fall Summit hosted 49 attendees online in an informative discussion of advocacy and voting led by Lisa Maatz. If you missed it, the Middletown AAUW website offers a similar Maatz conference hosted by AAUW of Texas.

Diversity in Middletown

I never thought much about diversity in Middletown until I accepted the job to look out for diversity in our AAUW Organization. I find myself asking the question: What does that mean? I spent some time looking at statistics this week to understand diversity in Middletown (and Lebanon as we have new members from there). I want to look at just one of them this month. The statistic that caught me by surprise was 86% of Middletown's adult population have a high school diploma (93% Lebanon) but only 16.4% are college graduates (29% Lebanon). In Butler County, 39.7% have a college degree (26% Ohio, 34% Nationally). What are the barriers for residents of Middletown?

One of our goals is to raise money for scholarships and this past year our leadership investigated what was the need. They discovered it was more than tuition but also other financial barriers such as childcare and reliable transportation. So they became flexible with our scholarship money. What other things can we do as women who have found college educations to be of value? How can we encourage and facilitate a college education for others in our community?



AAUW" Public Policy Priorities

AAUW's Public Policy Priorities, adopted every two years by every-member vote, establish the federal action issues on which AAUW members across the country focus their advocacy efforts and guide the work of the national staff. AAUW branches should use the Public Policy Priorities to determine their advocacy efforts on state and local issues. In the fall of even-numbered years the AAUW Public Policy Committee (APPC) solicits feedback from members and staff to develop proposed Public Policy Priorities based on viability, critical need, strong member support, and potential for distinctive contribution. Once the draft is developed, it is posted online for a comment period and submission of additional proposed revisions. The APPC then finalizes the proposed Public Policy Priorities, and the AAUW Board of Directors reviews, amends as necessary, and approves them before they go to the membership for a vote in the spring of odd-numbered years.

2019–21 AAUW Public Policy Priorities

The Public Policy Priorities underscore AAUW's mission to advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy. The work of AAUW builds upon responsible public participation, and the following priorities provide a basis for AAUW members' actions at the local, state, national, and international levels. Implicit in each is support for government agencies administering programs, including adequate appropriations, effective and accountable administration, and provision for citizen participation. AAUW advocates public discussion to ensure enlightened decisions on these priorities. AAUW works to increase the number of women and other underrepresented populations in policy- and other decision-making positions. AAUW's positions are shaped by a commitment to being nonpartisan and fact-based, and to acting with integrity. AAUW strives for work to be inclusive and intersectional, collaborating with diverse allies and coalitions to achieve equity for all. Basic to all of AAUW's public policy efforts is the understanding that true equity requires a balance between the rights of the individual and the needs of the community. AAUW opposes all forms of discrimination and supports constitutional protection for the civil rights of all individuals.
