Thursday, March 18 at 7:00 pm American Like Me: Reflections On Life Between Cultures – America Ferrera,



AAUW Diversity

How do I describe myself? I am a mother, I am a teacher, I grew up in New Jersey, I am retired, I am female, I am married to a male, my roots are in England and Scotland. All of these things are elements of my identity. Try this exercise for yourself. How do you describe yourself? As I look at these things, at this point I cannot change them. They influence who I am. They make me unique.

When you meet someone new, what do you notice? Jane Elsea in her book 4 Minute Sell suggests our society tends to notice these things in order of importance:

- Skin Color
- Eye contact
- Gender
- Eye contact Movement
- Age
- Personal SpaceTouch
- Appearance
- Facial expressions

Jane Elsea says "When we see another person, we notice, make assessments, and make decisions about how to interact with that individual based on these nine factors. These reactions, based on split-second assessments of others, influence our relationships."

How does my fixed identity influence how I react to these variables? I wondered. I will try to pay attention to what I notice first and how I react. I do notice that during this time of COVID I find I normally get clues from facial expressions. When I am traversing Krogers with a mask on, I want people to see my smile when I yield to their cart or wait patiently for the deli or meat clerk. I feel very unfriendly when I turn away from someone passing.

Hearing the stories in our Book Club choice for this month, American Like Me made me aware of just how many skin colors there are and what their experiences of reactions and prejudice have been. I want to do better.

Southwest Regional AAUW To Meet on ZOOM April 17

Plans are in the works for a ZOOM Southwest Regional AAUW Spring Conference on Saturday, April 17, from 10 am until noon. In keeping with the state's recommendation. the topic will be Education, Equity, and Advocacy. The education topic will focus on education for careers with news from career centers. The Equity topic will allow members to focus on the national AAUW webinar on diversity. Advocacy will include ideas from the two-minute activist, gerrymandering issues, and a discussion of the upcoming vote for dropping the degree requirement for AAUW membership. That voting will occur online from April 17 through May 17.

Other News:

The AAUW State Board is recommending a focus next year on issues related to paid leave for women, pregnancy leave, and a flexible work schedule.

National AAUW dues will rise to a total seventy-two dollars per year by 2024 with a three dollar increase in 2022, a five dollar increase in 2023, and another five dollar increase in 2024.
