In 2020 Marshall High School was recognized for the IMPACT project award for its service for the community. The school has also been recognized by its parent company Oakmont Group as a school of example for several years in a row. 
# Joy Luck Book Club

As we approach the first of our 2021-2022 AAUW programs, I hope that this newsletter finds you well. I hope you all have been able to see family and friends again during this summer! The program committee has put together some exciting meetings. Please know that all meetings will have a zoom option. Two of our winter meetings will be zoom meetings only, as our speakers will be from outside of this area. As we are still living in a pandemic, please keep up with the newsletter and any other contacts, like emails, concerning possible changes to in-person meetings, just in case.

Our first meeting will be a pot-luck dinner at 6pm on Monday, September 13, 2021. We will be visiting Marshall High School (4720 Roosevelt Blvd. Middletown, OH 45044). Marshall High School is a dropout recovery program school. Marshall has just recently added a wing onto the building to hold the career program classes. I will be providing some insight into the school and giving everyone a tour of the building. There will be others from the staff there as well, giving some information about the school. As of September, any person who visits the school must wear a mask. We will also need to use masks when we have our meetings at the Kettering Hospital community room and at Middletown High School. At other times I suggest we wear masks until we are advised differently by the CDC or the State of Ohio.

This summer the board met several times to discuss some changes to our scholarship fund at the Middletown Community Foundation. We wanted to make sure the Community Foundation had a better idea of whom we wanted to receive our scholarships, and we wanted to make sure we had the correct type of account per our non-profit status. We also set up a long-term goal for our organization of trying to grow our fund's principal amount to \$140,000, at which point our scholarship program could be self-sustaining at its current level. This would allow us to keep our scholarships going even if our current fundraising activities don't always continue to be as successful. We currently have \$40,000 in the account. Any donations made directly to the Middletown Community Foundation are tax-deductible. If anyone feels moved to make such donations, please make sure to request that the funds go towards the AAUW scholarship funds.

I want to take a minute to thank those who have recently made donations to our organization for our programming and our scholarships. We as a group thank you from the bottom of our hearts. It is because of members like you that make this group so outstanding.

Talking about fundraising, what a great success the garage sale was this summer! Thank you to everyone who helped in some way with the garage sale. We did an amazing job with the funds raised. Next we have our September Book Sale, and we need everyone to help in some way. Many have helped to prepare for the sale, and we need for others to sign up to work some hours during the actual sale. Make sure to come by and buy books! Thank you to all those who have already helped; the site looks outstanding and filled to the brim. The Holiday Bazaar sale will be in November and will also be for two weekends. We will not be having our preview sale for just AAUW members nor doing the bakery sale. Foods that are sealed will be allowed to be sold. Please reach out to our chair members to see what will be permitted. Again, many thanks to everyone whose contributions make our fundraisers possible!

### **Update from the State**

The Ohio Fall Summit will be held via Zoom on October 16 from 9-12. Speakers will address topics related to this year's theme "Diversity of Membership and Empowerment." Members will register in advance and pay a summit fee of \$10.00 to defray the cost of speakers. Topics discussed to create this year's theme were: the lack of racial and cultural diversity in our branches; the need to attract (and keep as members) representatives of different age groups, cultures, and races; and research that shows members of groups in general are like their leaders. Furthermore, membership and the number of branches are both down. Ohio has 27 branches, maybe 26 if Defiance closes shop.

According to JoAnn Benseler, a scaled-back BeWise Camp for girls was a success for the local girls who were able to attend the day camp. The organization ran two camps, one for 27 girls in 5-6th grade and one for 24 girls in 7-9th grade. Because of Covid-19, plans are still up in the air for next summer's camp. 
