Redistricting in Ohio has always been a quagmire, but an important one. We are excited to have a panel of members from the League of Women Voters of the Greater Dayton Area at our October meeting to help us untangle this aspect of Ohio's voting law. The panel will discuss the history of gerrymandering, Ohio's redistricting process, its impact on voters, and what to expect going forward.

We are honored to have this very distinguished panel:

Lucy Anne McKosky is a longtime LWV member who has worked on redistricting efforts for the past 10 years. After a career in education and technical training, she has devoted her retirement to educating voters, serving as editor of the *Voters Guide* for Montgomery and Greene Counties for the past several years. She also participated in local mapmaking efforts and testified at Redistricting Commission public hearings.

Kim Senft-Paras was appointed Chair of the Redistricting/ Fair Elections Committee for the Dayton LWV in February 2021. The committee was formed to support the Fair Districts Ohio collaborative between Common Cause Ohio and the Ohio League of Women Voters by engaging and educating residents using printed materials, presentations, etc. throughout the community. Like Lucy Anne, she participated in local mapmaking efforts and testified at Redistricting Commission public hearings.

Dennis Turner is professor emeritus at the University of Dayton School of Law. He was one of the original five faculty members who started the law school in 1974. Dennis is also a longtime member of the League and has been working on the issue of redistricting for many years.

Book Sale Yields \$7,500 for Scholarships

Our 66th annual book sale was a success, generating about \$7,500 for scholarships. "The help from our members this year was great," said book sale co-chair Tina Newlin. "Over two-thirds of our membership participated in some way by collecting, donating, pricing, arranging and selling. They even signed up early to work the sale so that recruitment was not required. It was much appreciated!"

As always, there are many books that do not sell. Those have been donated to a variety of organizations, including Art Central, Rosa Parks Elementary School, Love Packages, Rick and Pam Gibbs (for their Bible ministry), Garfield Junior High in Hamilton, Warren County Correctional Institution, Lebanon Correctional Institution, and the Behavioral Health Unit at Atrium Medical Center. Michael McNeil also took large print books to a retirement home in Springfield.



Marshall High School students helped us pack the leftovers for pick-up by One Way Farm and then took 16 boxes of cookbooks back to school for the opening of their Culinary Unit in the spring. This year we are also partnering with Matthew 25 Ministries, which is taking books that One Way Farm cannot.


