Recycle, Reuse, Recreate: Keeping Fabrics Out of Landfills

At our October branch meeting we will be learning about Thread Up Oxford, a non-profit dedicated to keeping textile waste out of landfills. The organization educates consumers about the impact of our "fast fashion" culture and promotes textile reuse and recycling in the Oxford, Ohio area.

"Fast fashion" means cheap, throw-away, massproduced clothing that is often made by exploited workers, using toxic chemicals dyes which add to global water pollution.

State Meeting Highlights Reproductive Issues

AAUW Ohio's 2023 Fall Summit was held on Sept. 30 in Worthington. Carolyn Smith and Debbie Worbis represented our branch, where a major focus was on reproductive issues in Ohio and the challenges facing the Amendment to the Ohio Constitution, titled "The Right to Reproductive Freedom with Protections for Health and Safety." This amendment protects the individual's right to make decisions about contraception, fertility treatments, miscarriage care, and abortion, among others.

We encourage you to visit <u>ReadTheAmendment.com</u> order to get familiar with the amendment's language, as the ballot includes vocabulary changes meant to confuse the issue. Members wishing to become more involved can contact Ohioans United for Reproductive Rights.

Remaining items were given to a variety of thankful recipients, including Warren County Correctional Institution, Lebanon Correctional Institution, Middletown City Jail, Rosa Parks Elementary School in Middletown, Fairwood Elementary School in Hamilton, Art Central Foundation, Pam and Rick Gibbs' Bible Ministry, Love Packages, Atrium Medical Center Friends Program and Goodwill. Cookbooks were provided to the Culinary Arts programs at Madison High School and Marshall High School. Marshall High School students were a great help in boxing and moving books, then bringing holiday items out of storage for our November holiday sale.

Congratulations and many thanks to all who worked on our 2023 book sale! We especially appreciate the continued leadership and hard work of Libby Abele, Sharon Dowden and Tina Newlin, our book sale co-chairs. We recognize that it takes the contributions of all of the members who participate in so many ways – collecting, sorting, carrying, pricing, arranging, selling, and also purchasing – to make this sale a success year after year. With the proceeds from this year's sale, we have the funds required to support our local scholarship recipients and BeWise campers.

One of those campers gave an enthusiastic report to members at our opening branch meeting on Sept. 11. Middle school student Makayla Pringle-Foster (shown below at our meeting and at camp) shared her photos with members and talked about the wolf that fascinated her at camp, the friendships she made with other campers, and her own aspirations to eventually become a veterinarian.

We also reviewed the many ways in which AAUW promotes equity through workshops, fellowships and grants, and political action. As I watched the shoppers at the book sale, I was aware that our book sale not only helps our scholarship recipients, but also makes it possible for readers from a range of income groups to build their personal libraries at a very low cost.

Even after the book sale has ended, we contribute books to different groups and institutions. Teachers at schools receiving those donations are then able to provide more reading materials to their young readers, even rewarding some with free books. Students from Marshall High School gain community service experience when they help us to pack up and move the remaining books. Over time, our book sale leaders have found many places that can use the items we don't sell, making this a successful recycling program for hundreds of books.

On Oct. 9 at 7 pm, we will learn about another kind of recycling when we welcome Shana Rosenberg, founder of Thread Up Oxford. I hope you will be able to join us for that program at the Kettering Health Center or on Zoom.
